Conference Date/Time: Thursday, March 15, 2018 from 8:30 a.m. to 2:15 p.m.

Venue: Rabobank Convention Center, 1001 Truxtun Avenue, Bakersfield 93301

Target Audience: High school, middle school, and 6th through 8th grade students who attend K-8 schools

- Your school/agency is invited to <u>send up to the maximum number of students you indicated</u> on your Intent to Participate form.
- Each school/agency is also required to obtain permission slips for each student and keep those slips on file.
- The Youth Conference Planning Committee encourages you to fill your available slots with students from diverse ethnic and cultural backgrounds and academic achievement levels who would not ordinarily experience a conference of this nature, (ASB or campus club officers are only part of the target audience for this conference).
- Students participating on the conference planning committee need not be included in your registration.

Purpose: The day is planned by youth for youth with the assistance of adult advisors. Students in attendance will have the opportunity to discuss and evaluate issues they face daily, to learn more about community resources, and to plan for their future in a positive environment.

Format: General conference format - Keynote and Guest Speakers, breakout sessions and vendor fair

Media: State law permits media access to student events. The news media may elect to cover all or part of this event with photos, video, or text, which identifies and/or quotes the student. News coverage may appear in newspapers, newsletters, on television, radio, or other publicly circulated communications. This coverage assists in highlighting many wonderful student-led projects in our county and across the region.

Logistics

Registration Fee: \$20 per person (students, advisors, and chaperones)

- Includes lunch, materials and conference t-shirt
- If your Intent to Participate form was not received by February 5, 2018 your registration fees will be \$25 \$30 per person as indicated on that form.

T-shirts: Conference theme t-shirt with the Leaders in Life logo will be issued to each person registered

- School/Agency contact will be notified when shirts are available and asked to make arrangements to pick them up.
- Participating students, advisors, and chaperones are <u>required</u> to wear the t-shirt in order to enter the conference.
 Students not wearing the conference t-shirt will not be allowed to participate.

Chaperones:

- The required student to adult ratio is 10:1 and you are responsible for providing enough advisors/chaperones for your student attendees.
- School/agency employees as well as parents may serve as advisors or chaperones and are encouraged to help stimulate learning through discussion and debriefing of each segment of the conference.
- Advisors/chaperones are required to stay with the students throughout the entire day. Schools or agencies in violation of this request may be asked to leave the conference.

Important Information for Advisors and/or Chaperones

We greatly appreciate your support for young people and for our conference for youth planned by youth. It is truly a unique event, one of the largest youth conferences planned by teens in the entire United States. The Youth Planning Committee, with over 120 young people, has been working very hard to plan this conference to give young people a voice in our community and to show what great things young people can accomplish.

The purpose of this conference and resource fair is to provide youth with an opportunity to learn more about community resources, a chance to plan for their future, and a positive and safe environment to discuss and evaluate issues they face daily.

Students and advisors will receive conference materials, lunch and a conference theme t-shirt. The agenda, guidelines, maps to breakout sessions and school/agency nametags will be distributed to all students and advisors/chaperones at conference check-in. Groups will also be issued colored wrist bands that each person must wear all day. Anyone without a wristband will not receive lunch.

<u>Please note for safety reasons:</u> All students and chaperones will be provided T-shirts that must be worn on the day of the conference. This allows event organizers to identify authorized attendees and keep out unauthorized persons. Students and chaperones, not wearing T-shirts, will not be admitted to the conference. Also, all student groups (10 students & 1 adult chaperone) MUST stay together in their groups throughout the conference. Advisors/chaperones MUST stay with students the ENTIRE day, this means during opening and keynote speakers, during workshops, and during lunch. There should be no time when chaperones and youth are separated. Any group in violation of this request may be asked to leave the conference.

The <u>designated parking</u> area for school busses and agency vans or personal vehicles is in the <u>P1 parking area</u>, located directly south of the Convention Center (Rabobank Arena). Students may be dropped off along Truxtun Avenue and "N" Streets. Parking passes are <u>not</u> necessary or required. Busses and vehicles not parked in this designated area may be subject to parking tickets. REGISTRATION AND CHECK-IN WILL BE LOCATED IN FRONT OF THE RABOBANK CONVENTION CENTER.

ALL ADULT ADVISORS: PLEASE READ THIS INFORMATION BEFORE ENTERING THE RABOBANK CONVENTION CENTER ON REQUIRED ADULT SUPERVISION OF STUDENTS AT THIS YOUTH CONFERENCE

Please note the required student to adult ratio is 10:1 and your school/agency is responsible for providing enough advisors/chaperones for your student attendees. Adult Advisors are required to stay with the students throughout the entire day. Schools or agencies in violation of this request may be asked to leave the conference.

It has been our experience that 95% of the adult advisors follow these guidelines. Unfortunately, some do not. It has come to our attention that some adult advisors do not accompany their students/youth throughout the day. Sadly we have had feedback from several schools that they will NOT attend our conference this year because they had a negative experience in workshops, in the main auditorium or Resource Fair with students left unattended. They said these students were interrupting youth presenters/speakers and using exceedingly foul language, even when asked by adult advisors from other schools to stop talking rudely or to stop using their cell phones. We had some vandalism in restrooms in past years that we were sent a repair bill to pay out of the conference fees. We are able to keep the cost for the conference very affordable (t-shirt, lunch and national speakers and workshops for aprox. \$20.00 per person) so that ALL students can attend. We have a very diverse group of student planners from all types of schools (public, private, community, continuation, charter) and that is the way we want to keep it.

If this happens this year, the unsupervised student groups will be asked to join their adult advisor and leave the conference and we will follow this up with a letter to the school Principal and Superintendent or Agency Director.

Please discuss your expectations for appropriate behavior with your students prior to entering the Convention Center. Remind your adult advisors that their role is to show they value your students by spending time WITH THEM today as they attend workshops, discuss speakers and talk with them about what they hear and see. We look forward to your support on this as it sends a clear message to your students that they matter and that you care about them.
